Since opening as a non-profit community organization on October 1, 2007, the Lana'i Culture & Heritage Center (LCHC) has hosted more than 4,400 residents and visitors in programs at the center and in field outings. A New Historical Book Published by the Lana'i Culture & Heritage Center (Lana'i Publications Available at the Lana'i CHC)

"Once Again," has just arrived here on Lana'i. This book provides readers with a chronological history of Lana'i, including its natural history, the traditional Hawaiian period, and facets of the missionary, ranching and plantation eras on Lana'i. Of particular interest to many readers, will be original eyewitness and Hawaiian language accounts documenting *wahi pana* (storied and sacred places) of Lana'i. Also, a new historical reference guide to Lana'i City has just been published. This guide documents the history of Lana'i City's earliest shops and proprietors. Both of these publications were developed by the Lana'i CHC and printed with funds donated to the center.

Also available at the LCHC are several other important books on Lana'i, and the 2006 map of Lana'i (documenting place names, topography, roads and trails), printed as a part of George Munro's "The Story of Lana'i."

Field Programs Offered

In an effort to document the cultural and natural landscape of Lana'i, and share some of the significant resources of the island with families, the Lana'i Culture & Heritage Center, in partnership with the 'Ahaui 'Imi Pono o Lana'i (formerly Hui Malama Pono o Lana'i) will be hosting monthly field seminars and service trips. The goal of the program is to foster a greater awareness of Lana'i's rich heritage, and develop a renewed sense of

stewardship and responsibility for our island's unique resources. We believe that increased awareness of the natural and cultural resources of Lana'i, will lead to improved care and appreciation of those resources.

We are planning excursions and periodic service trips to various sites that will be offered one Saturday a month. The programs will be announced in The Lana'i Times, or information available by calling the LCHC, or by checking www.Lana'iCHC.org. The trips will generally start around 8am, meeting at the flagpole in front of the old Dole Administration Building. Depending on the destination and focus of the field seminar, the trips will either be driving tours (carpooling always recommended), or involve driving to a particular area, and then hiking. Some trips will require good physical stamina, while others will be easy for most participants. As each program is planned, information on requirements, activities and a potluck lunch will be announced. Resource people will accompany the group on the field seminar/service projects, and history of Lana'i will be shared.
